This year has been hectic especially during the second half, due mainly to the finalizing of the Special Publication No. 3 (SP III) on *No-Till Farming Systems* that took up most of our time. But we were able to get the volume out to serve members in a good time, with the first bound volume coming out on November 30. Printing of the SP III is going on at the printshop in Thailand and I will send them to members who had ordered once I get back home this weekend, which may take quite a while to finish sending all 7,000 copies. So far, the book has been distributed to participants to the Soil Science Conference in Guangzhou, China, on December 1, and to the Direct Seeding Mulch-based Cropping Systems Symposium in Antananarivo, Madagascar, on December 3 – both with good reception.

Our association has an **Awards Committee** comprising Prof Stanimir Kostadinov (Chair), Prof Machito Mihara, Dr John Laflen, myself and Prof Miodrag Zlatic (Secretary – *ex officio*). The committee has considered a number of awards as proposed and is pleased to announce the results for 2007 as follows:

Distinguished SWC Extensionist Award. The Award goes to police second lieutenant Vichai Suriyuth who had in the last 20 years, during his government service and after retirement, 'planted' 2 million trees in public areas of his home district, Prang Koo, in Sri Sa Ket Province, Thailand. This is the only the award that carries a small cash.

Distinguished SWC Researchers Award. The Committee grant this award to a group of researchers, Reinhardt H. Howeler of CIAT, Colombia; Watana Watananonta of Department of Agricultural Extension, Thailand and Tran Ngoc Ngoan of Thai Nguan University of Agriculture and Forestry of Vietnam. The work is illustrated in the paper, Farmer Participation in Research and Extension: The Key to AchivingAdoption of More Sustainable Cassava Production Practices on Sloping Land in Asia and Their Impact on Farmers' Income, appearing in the WASWC's book Monitoring and Evaluation of Soil Conservation and Watershed Development Projects, published by the Science Publishers <u>www.scipub.net</u>. They had conducted a long-term (1994-2003) SWC project that covered all biophysical and socioeconomic aspects of large numbers of farm communities that grow cassava in several Asian countries – with favorable and concrete results.

Honorary Membership Award. Since a couple of years ago, John Burton, a citizen of New Jersey, U.S.A. had entered our association to serve as a guest editor of the Climate Change webpage and helps advising about what's going on in that area that we should be aware of and also to participate in. More over, he had kindly put our association in the donation list that he assists various volunteer groups annually. The Awards Committee therefore agreed to grant John this award.

Norman Hudson Memorial Award. Hans Hurni of University of Berne, Switzerland, had initiated the World Overview of Conservation Approaches and Technology (WOCAT) Program since 1992, with a target to map all territories of the world within 6 years in terms of technologies and the ways (approaches) they have been used to materialize in conserving soil and water resources by using 'existing' knowledge that experts (local and international) work out together in yearly meetings. The work had not finished by then (1998), but it was found a huge 'treasure trove' of SWC information could be gathered, synthesized and finalized in that way, with a result that the first ever major publication of this program, the WOCAT global overview book, could be published after 14 years, in late 2006. Since Hans had initiated this new program, which is considered very useful and is still ongoing healthily in various parts of the world, the Committee saw his work of great value and agreed to grant him this prestigious Award. Previous Award recipients include Calvin Rose (Australia - 2004), Rolf Derpsch (Paraguay - 2005) and John Greenfield (New Zealand - 2006).

Details of all these awards granted for 2007 will be available in subsequent issues of WASWC Newsletter.





1. Individual membership: US\$5/yr for developing countries; US\$10 for developed countries and people working in international organizations worldwide. Payment of the fee for 4 years at the same time will enable the membership to be valid for 5 years.

2. Life membership: US\$80 for developing countries; US\$160 for developed countries and people working in international organizations worldwide

3-1.
