

Why are we so late this time?

Since the first issue of HOT NEWS for this year came out on the New Year day, it has taken over two months before the next one is ready to release. What has happened or, to be more exact, why are we very late?



We have to apologize for this slow action in making this publication of WASWC come out so late. But there is a reason for what had happened. Apart from the WASWC Newsletter (our flagship) we consider HOT NEWS to be almost equally important in terms of the medium between members and us. In fact, there should not be any delay had we not produced the No-Till Farming Systems book. Thinking seriously, to have the latter published is worthwhile, as it has come into the agronomic literary system just in a good time when such technologies to reduce undesired effects on our Earth are being seriously sought.

It was an amazing act in producing this No-Till book. We spent 3 years to start the work with five chapters written by Western Hemisphere gurus. Once these manuscripts were ready to go to the printshop, we announced to find co-publishers, just as a way to get copies spread to readers quicker. Unexpectedly, a storm of authors came with almost 30 additional papers, all being in line with the concept of the editors that the book will be used as the baseline

for people to know this no-tillage practice that imparts so many usefulnesses to farmers and to the Earth at the same time. It took only 4 months for the group of six editors to finish their crisp manuscripts and get the book printed. Then it took another 3 months to deliver over 7,000 copies (weighing 4.2 tons) to readers all over the world, mostly by post. Photos below show parts of the book production and distribution process. We thank the cooperation and help of the Funny Publishing of Bangkok in handling this work nicely, so far the biggest contract in their 35-year history.




Our association has not been designed or equipped to publish any kind of publication like this No-Till book. In the former time, the Soil and Water Conservation Society in Iowa, U.S.A., had done that duty for us. Now, after having departed from U.S.A. we have to venture into these businesses and I myself have got to handle that duty almost off guard! But only with good support from many of our officers, especially Bill Moldenhauer and John Laflen in America, this initial stage of book publishing proceeded almost without any problem. I am sure within April all the boxes containing these books will reach their readers – mostly by boat.

After sending off the copies of the book, I started to finalize the CD that contains stuffs sent to us by members showing no-till works in many countries, plus other works concerning soil and water conservation and related fields that our members were involved. Actually the process was near to complete a few weeks ago but my computer had crashed and it took so long to fish out the specific files from thousands of them after getting recovered by an IT specialist.

Anyhow, the final product of this CD will prove quite useful, as it contains 17 folders, with 1,009 files together and occupy the whole space of it. The hundreds of PPT and PDF files will be useful for general reading, planning research, presenting to colleague researchers or teaching students for quite several hours.

This CD will be sent to those who had ordered it right away after the factory delivers



The CD is to accompany every copy of the book when purchased from now on, with the price for the set established for various destinations, i.e. US\$15 for Asean countries; \$16 for other Asian countries; \$18 for Africa, Australia, Europe, Oceania; and \$20 for the Western Hemisphere..

The CD is also available separately at US\$5/copy, with airmail delivery to any post address. Since there are a lot of materials that can be useful to people of many careers, we have dedicated it as a contribution to the International Year of Planet Earth.



Following is a short history of St Patrick, the patron saint of Ireland. I copied it from a website http://www.st-patricks-day.com/about_saintpatrick.asp and think WASWC members who are interested in history and culture will find this useful to know little more after having heard so much about the St Patrick's Parade all over the world on this day as well as about everything Irish.

ABOUT SAINT PATRICK



Saint Patrick is believed to have been born in the late fourth century, and is often confused with Palladius, a bishop who was sent by Pope Celestine in 431 to be the first bishop to the Irish believers in Christ.

Saint Patrick was the patron saint and national apostle of Ireland who is credited with bringing christianity to Ireland. Most of what is known about him comes from his two works, the Confessio, a spiritual autobiography, and his Epistola, a denunciation of British mistreatment of Irish christians. Saint Patrick described himself as a "most humble-minded man,"



pouring forth a continuous paean of thanks to his Maker for having chosen him as the instrument whereby multitudes who had worshipped idols and unclean things had become the people of God."

Saint Patrick is most known for driving the snakes from Ireland. It is true there are no snakes in Ireland, but there probably never have been - the island was separated from the rest of the continent at the end of the Ice Age. As in many old pagan religions, serpent symbols were common and often worshipped. Driving the snakes from Ireland was probably symbolic of putting an end to that pagan practice. While not the first to bring christianity to Ireland, it is Patrick who is said to have encountered the Druids at Tara and abolished their pagan rites. The story holds that he converted the warrior chiefs and princes, baptizing them and thousands of their subjects in the "Holy Wells" that still bear this name.

There are several accounts of Saint Patrick's death. One says that Patrick died at Saul, Downpatrick, Ireland, on March 17, 460 A.D. His jawbone was preserved in a silver shrine and was often requested in times of childbirth, epileptic fits, and as a preservative against the "evil eye." Another account says that St. Patrick ended his days at Glastonbury, England and was buried there. The Chapel of St. Patrick still exists as part of Glastonbury Abbey. Today, many Catholic places of worship all around the world are named after St. Patrick, including cathedrals in New York and Dublin city

Why Saint Patrick's Day?

Saint Patrick's Day has come to be associated with everything Irish: anything green and gold, shamrocks and luck. Most importantly, to those who celebrate its intended meaning, St. Patrick's Day is a traditional day for spiritual renewal and offering prayers for missionaries worldwide.

So, why is it celebrated on March 17th? One theory is that that is the day that St. Patrick died. Since the holiday began in Ireland, it is believed that as the Irish spread out around the world, they took with them their history and celebrations. The biggest observance of all is, of course, in Ireland. With the exception of restaurants and pubs, almost all businesses close on March 17th. Being a religious holiday as well, many Irish attend mass, where March 17th is the traditional day for offering prayers for missionaries worldwide before the serious celebrating begins. In American cities with a large Irish population, St. Patrick's Day is a very big deal. Big cities and small towns alike celebrate with parades, "wearing of the green," music and songs, Irish food and drink, and activities for kids such as crafts, coloring and games. Some communities even go so far as to dye rivers or streams green!

This marks the fourth round of the internationally renowned Equator Prize. Awarded biennially, the Equator Prize recognizes community-based initiatives that demonstrate extraordinary achievement in reducing poverty through the conservation and sustainable use of biodiversity in the equatorial belt. ▲ Seven Wetland Stewards Win 2008 National Wetlands Awards – Environmental Law Institute

Washington, DC — Seven citizens have been recognized nationally for their on-the-ground wetland conservation efforts and decades-long dedication to protecting these important natural resources. A diverse panel of wetland experts assembled at the Environmental Law Institute (ELI) earlier this month to select the winners of the 2008 National Wetlands Awards.

This year's Award winners hail from all regions of the country and exemplify the extraordinary commitment and innovation that is so instrumental to conserving wetlands in the nation's communities. "These wetland champions are restoring and protecting one of America's greatest natural assets through education, conservation, and dedication," said Benjamin H. Grumbles, EPA's Assistant Administrator

for Water. "These profiles, both in courage and in stewardship, show us all how to meet the President's national goal of increasing, not simply maintaining, the quantity and quality of our wetlands.

The 2008 awardees are:

- Valer and Josiah Austin, landowners from Arizona who have restored miles of wetlands on their ranch lands and worked on cross-border watershed management to restore wetland habitat;
- Caroline Dean, a horticulturalist and teacher from Alabama who has led advocacy and education efforts to protect native flora and wildflowers found in wetlands throughout the Southeastern United States;
- **John Dorney**, the Supervisor of the North Carolina Division of Water Quality's Program Development Unit who has been instrumental in the development of the state's wetland and stream protection programs;
- **Mildred Majoros**, a Project Manager with the Trust for Public Land in Florida who has led efforts to protect hundreds of acres of coastal habitat in Puerto Rico;
- **Dianne Nygaard**, the founder of the non-profit Preserve Calavera who has raised awareness and aided in the purchase and restoration of wetlands in California;
- **Raymond Semlitsch**, a Professor in the Division of Biological Sciences at the University of Missouri-Columbia whose research on amphibian ecology has raised awareness about the need to protect small wetlands and surrounding terrestrial habitat.

Collectively, the award winners have conserved thousands of wetland acres and have mobilized hundreds of individuals to contribute to wetland conservation. In May, they will take a well-deserved break from their efforts to receive their awards at a ceremony on Capitol Hill.

"We look forward to meeting the winners of this year's awards and honoring them for their extraordinary achievements in wetland conservation," said Dr. Jim Balsiger, Acting Assistant Administrator for Fisheries, NOAA National Marine Fisheries Service. "We are proud to support ELI's National Wetlands Awards recognizing these individuals for their contributions to society and the aquatic environment. Healthy wetlands and ecosystems are vital to our nation's recreational and commercial fish and shellfish fisheries, and other living marine resources."

Program co-sponsors—the Environmental Law Institute, U.S. Environmental Protection Agency, U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, USDA Forest Service, USDA Natural Resources Conservation Service, Federal Highway Administration, U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and NOAA National Marine Fisheries Service—hope that recognizing wetland leaders for their efforts will inspire others to follow their example. Given the national importance of wetlands, the federal agencies that sponsor the Awards welcome the opportunity to recognize and encourage voluntary wetland conservation efforts.

"Wetlands are a vital link between our land and water resources, and they provide a variety of ecological services to forests and grasslands. The Forest Service is proud to support the National Wetlands Awards program and to recognize the extraordinary work of the Award recipients," commented Abigail R. Kimbell, Chief of USDA Forest Service.

The winners of the National Wetlands Awards demonstrate how citizens and communities can—and do—make a difference. Arlen Lancaster, Chief of USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service, stated, "Wetlands are some of the most productive and dynamic habitats in the world and are vital to the

overall health of the environment. I salute the 2008 National Wetlands Awards winners and thank them for their outstanding contributions to the conservation of our Nation's wetlands."

"Wetlands provide optimum migrating, wintering, and breeding habitat for waterfowl, shorebirds, wading birds and other wetland dependent wildlife species, as well as essential habitat for many neotropical birds. What we do for conservation today is important. What we do for conservation tomorrow is vital," said H. Dale Hall, Director of the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.

Second International Training Course on "Low cost Soil and Water Conservation Techniques and Watershed Management Activities".

The importance of watershed management in recent years has been increasing.

However, the success of watershed management related activities depends mainly on the type of approaches and technologies that are implemented. In the mountainous regions, broad based integrated approaches and low-cost, culturally-acceptable and demand-based technologies have more acceptance by the local people, especially the poor, than those which are supply-driven, less-affordable and exotic.

Low cost techniques (new and traditional) therefore play a very important role for the mountain regions which are vulnerable to physical disasters and where peoples are poor and marginalized. A Soil Conservation and Watershed Management Programme will produce impact only if the activity is implemented in a package.

The challenge in the mountains, e.g. the Himalaya, is that field-level professionals responsible for implementing watershed management projects and programmes lack proper knowledge and skill on low cost soil and water conservation techniques. They are also not conceptually clear on what integrated watershed management means and what activities are required to achieve it. ICIMOD, together with some key partners, has initiated a training programme for bridging this gap. The Centre is going to conduct a 3-week training on "Low Cost Soil and Water Conservation Techniques and Watershed Management Activities" in 31 March-22 April 2008 (please see the attached brochure for details).

This training aims to improve the knowledge and skill of field technicians working in the field of soil conservation and watershed management. The course has been synthesized from the vast practical experiences from the mountain regions. This training focuses on capacity building and contains many field and practical exercises. The training will be participatory and based on the principles of experiential learning

Course Description

Like many places in the tropical Pacific, Fiji's coasts, reefs and fisheries have suffered severe degradation in recent decades from the combined effects of development, overfishing, and tourism. The issue of how to respond has placed Fiji at the forefront of a series of global debates about the links between conservation and human well-being.

Two factors are especially salient in Fiji's efforts to promote marine conservation. First, local communities continue to exercise authority over their reefs through traditional resource management institutions. In the last decade the Fiji Locally-Managed Marine Area network (FLMMA), has actively promoted and supported the proliferation of community-based marine conservation initiatives managed according to traditional institutions, and it has been touted globally as an exemplar of effective community-based conservation. Second, Fiji has recently emerged as a major global tourist destination, renowned for its white sand beaches, crystal-clear water, brilliant living reefs, and world-class waves. Resorts of all types have sprung up to satisfy tourist demand, ranging from village homestays, to backpacker camps with dormitory accommodation, to exclusive \$1000-a-day resorts. One of the most notable trends has been the growth of ecotourism, which is presented as a less intrusive, more beneficial and sustainable form of tourism, striving to maintain the smallest possible ecological footprint and

simultaneously supporting both conservation goals and local livelihoods. However, the distinction between tourism and ecotourism is not necessarily as clear as we may think: both large and small resorts may have adverse effects on the environment, and both may also promote the commodification of culture. The bottom line is that in Fiji marine conservation is tied up both with community rights and with tourism.

This course will examine the link between local communities, tourism and marine conservation through field-based research and service learning in two communities: Waitabu on the island of Taveuni and Soso on the island of Naviti. Additionally, we will also visit a series of resorts in the Mamanuca island chain. We will spend approximately one week in each community, living with local families. Research will focus on two main issues. First, students will look at traditional resource management institutions and the ways in which rights to resources are both defined and contested. Second, they will document local knowledge of reefs and resources, with a view to producing a set of maps that these two communities can use to support their conservation efforts. Integrating ethnographic and GIS methods, students will work with local community members to map reefs and other marine resources. They will also interview community members and participate in fishing and other marine! subsistence activities with community members in order to document resource use. Finally, they will be responsible for providing their research results in forms that are useful to the community, possibly through digital maps or through production of an interpretive brochure that the communities can use to generate tourism revenue.

Interviewers should also be sensitive to the fact that some important ritual or other information might be secret and make it clear that they are not asking interview responders to talk about things that can't be talked about with outsiders, but that in such cases, very general comments would be appreciated.
- 7) What kind of connection is there (if any) between maintaining your culture and maintaining the natural world?
- 8) What are the biggest obstacles that you've faced in sustaining the natural world, your language, and your culture?
- 9) I would like you to imagine that you no longer have direct, everyday contact with nature (translated using the closest appropriate term). How would this affect your life and that of your village (people, community, tribe, etc.)?


