EDITOR's NOTE: Results from the discussion "Sharing information at a meeting"

Since we sent out the last HOT NEWS one month ago, we are delighted to have got back 10 responses, which all have agreed with our opinion – only one of them voicing out some reservations. We have reproduced all responses in the box that follows, showing the names of all respondents and their e-mail addresses, so that members may continue discussing about this issue furthermore. For the sake of an easy follow-up, we have put the previous script in another box, by using smaller letters to save space.

It is interesting to note that all 10 respondents have given their opinions frankly; all ideas are thus considered of great value. Then our wish to get the said information shared between authors and other participants may yield a practice that becomes standard soon.

Among these ideas, the one by Eric Roose (No. 8) shows the nature of an average academic that while being active in the service one may not want to share one's Powerpoints, as it is considered one's property that has been diligently devised by oneself. But only after the active years of service (Eric has recently retired), one may feel differently, that such materials should be shared among participants so that the technologies could spread faster, saving many hours that scientists have to try to do things that have been found earlier by some others.

The idea of Bruce Carey (No. 9) reflects what I have had for years – that participants have so little time (and chance) to view the presentations that proceed quickly from one to another, with time allowance of only 15-20 minutes each. In the case of holding concurrent sessions, the situation is worse: a participant may stay in only one room at one time and thus has no chance to see/know/understand what are being presented in other rooms. Having Powerpoints available 'to take home' is an excellent way that persons may benefit from participating in a meeting.

Arthur Conacher (No. 10), a senior academic with long experience in organizing meetings, reveals both positive and negative sides of 'sharing information'. We therefore need to respect the participants who want to publish their works in peer-reviewed scientific journals. That's why I put it last month that, certain slides (or the whole works) of some authors can be removed before submitting to the organizers to make a CD or to put in a flash drive and distribute. However, I have reservations about the statement that duplicating Powerpoint files to distribute among a group of people who attend a meeting will be '*legally considered a publication*' and will cause problem when publishing in a journal. Whatever it really is, my opinion is that **we should not be too protective of such materials, as that may become an obstacle to the dissemination of knowledge other people should have**, considering that we all live in only one world and what we are doing now is to help solve problems that we are facing or mitigate the destructive forces that are threatening our land and water resources. After all, each participant knows what one has and which slides one wants to preserve for future publication(s) and can thus remove them and let the rest become available to other people – or as the last resort, in case one is not sure what one wants to preserve for future use, one may decline to give it altogether and no one will complain about it. There is certainly no coercion about this matter at any one meeting. I am sure that at each meeting the number of authors who don't want to give their works will NOT be too many, leaving a good number of works available eventually. What has been mentioned in No. 10 is clear: in the process of collecting Powerpoints to make available to participants, the presenters must be made aware that they should retain the works (certain slides or the whole works) that they want to preserve for their future use.

The last point I would like to make is, the organizers in fact play a very big role in disseminating technologies, with the Powerpoints distribution included. If the organizers have good intention in making their events successful, with useful outcomes, they will find that making Powerpoints available to their participants is NOT difficult at all. They may simply collect the files from the laptop(s) being used at the meeting and make them available by either way, but they must inform all presenters about it and let some of them remove slides or the whole works that they want to preserve, as mentioned before. The reason why such thing has not been widely done is because of the *inaction* of organizers; some of them do not care about the outcomes from their events; they organize only for every purpose but quality and usefulness. I have noted from many meetings that I attended that in each of them a lot of presentations are of the nature that has reached the extension stage already and the authors are more than willing to have their works collected and distributed this way, but organizers simply do not do it, or are more concerned about a small number of authors who don't want to part with their works – then often letting participants go home empty-handed, as I said last month. I think if we are not serious about this point we will lose a chance to learn more about the development of technologies the world has achieved, and thus lose a chance to do more research by topping up those that are readily available. *It will be worthwhile to add this matter to the Guidelines for Successful Meetings (<http://waswc.soil.gd.cn/consti-decentra.html>), that the organizers should try to make the Powerpoints available, especially those that intend to join the LANDCON series of meetings. And we encourage all of us to ask the organizers for Powerpoints wherever we go to attend meetings.*

Very last point: As a very rough estimation, for attending a meeting, one may attain about 10-20% of the (technical) usefulness when nothing but a small abstract book is given. The usefulness may rise to 20-30% or even 40% when proceedings is available in either paper or CD form (depending on if one reads it after returning home). However, such usefulness will rise to as much as 50% or more if/when the powerpoints and the proceedings in either form are provided.

If you listen to someone giving a presentation with a Powerpoint, you may have time to take a few notes, *but how can you absorb everything they are trying to pass on if you don't get the Powerpoints?* Naturally though we have a few reservations about passing on all of our carefully selected images etc for others to use.

If people are reticent about sharing their Powerpoints an option is to pass on PDF versions – one problem though is that you lose any animations.

10. As one of the culprits I thank you for your email and attachment. With an important proviso, I support your proposal that organisers of meetings collect presentations on to a CD or equivalent, for distribution to those interested. However, presenters must be given the choice. For good reasons, most reputable journals (including the one I edit) require people submitting papers for publication to provide an assurance that the paper has not been published or submitted for publication elsewhere. *Presentations distributed on a CD are legally considered to be a publication.* Publishers are not interested in publishing second-hand research. Many journals are experiencing the problem of receiving manuscripts only slightly different from already-published papers: one of the unfortunate consequences of the pressures in today's academia.

For younger scientists especially, their careers depend on publication in peer-reviewed journals. They should not be pressured into distributing their work in non-recognised, non-peer reviewed outlets. This may be unfortunate, for all the reasons you give, but I think we have to recognise the reality.

Having said that, I think it is quite possible to distribute a Powerpoint presentation that is significantly different from the version published in a peer-reviewed journal: but researchers need to be made aware of the problem.

April HOT NEWS Editor's Comment: Sharing information at a meeting

Last year we were able to make the Guidelines for Successful Meetings and we now have a dozen meetings that have been lined up in our series of LANDCON that will take place within the next three years – with two meetings already organized in February and March, respectively. The guidelines (<http://waswc.soil.gd.cn/consti-decentra.html>) can be amended at anytime when the need arises.

What has perturbed me during last few years is that, the organizers of certain meetings do not care much about the benefits the participants should have, though they are not entirely to blame. There has been a visible trend that many meeting goes these days go abroad just for the sake of sightseeing, largely by spending the taxpayers' money, and the organizers just manage to comply with their desire.

Since several years ago, many organizers furnish the attendees with only an abstracts book, without any full papers – and participants only view the presentations (in most cases in the form of powerpoint – ppt) for some 15 minutes per paper, and sometimes there is a proceedings sent to participants in the form of CD or printed book but often there is nothing at all. That is more or less a norm.

However, in the last couple of years some organizers have done nicely; e.g. Dr Christian Feller of IRD, France (Christian.Feller@ird.fr) had organized a direct seeding (aka no-till) symposium in Madagascar in December 2007 and sent ppt presentations, photos and other stuff in a CD to all participants within a couple of months, to be followed with a well-edited report sent to all participants in both digital and printed form. The same thing was done when Dr Florent Tivet of Cirad, France (florent.tivet@cirad.fr) had organized a similar meeting in October 2008, now at Phonsavan in Laos. He and his diligent team members had worked very hard and were able to put one 1GB flash drive that contains all

presentations, photos and relevant stuff into the hand of each delegate when they parted – while the well-edited proceedings would be made available later. The works from both events have been incorporated in the SWAT DVD available from WASWC. Both of them deserve a big applause.

The availability of such things has delighted us a lot, since they will enable us to learn about the papers presented at the meeting slowly afterward and we may follow or adapt the methodologies for further works, as well as to use some materials for teaching or to take some slides to construct one's own work.

I consider that the availability of ppt presentations is our luck in the matter of technology transfer as we are in the digital age, so that meeting attendants can get something practical from attending one event to work further. This was not the case when we used transparencies over a decade ago. Therefore we should take this matter seriously and don't let such opportunity pass by when at this moment we are facing many threats and research and implementation in the field of managing and caring for natural resources have to be done urgently.

There was one meeting event that I have been quite disappointed. At that event last year, when the organizers were interested only in selecting a number of papers to publish in a peer-reviewed journal, I offered to put all ppt presentations together, along with photos and related stuff, and would send to everyone at no cost. There was an initial disinterest from certain developed country participants, with the reason that some of the slides in the ppt file had not yet been published. The discussion-cum-negotiation dragged on about whether to produce the CD or not – even with a choice to remove certain slides or the whole works of some authors who did not wish to participate. It ended up that all participants had to go home empty-handed, to a great disappointment of many developing country delegates. In fact, the organizers should realize that, when a person goes to a meeting, one always wants to have something to bring home to further their works and hence their progress. Such fact is more correct with developing country academics than developed country ones who have far better research facilities.

Therefore, I strongly suggest that all works in the form of ppt files presented at a meeting and other stuff must be collected to give to participants, with exception that the authors may choose to remove certain slides or even to remove one's whole work. **But NOT that all works of a meeting become unavailable to participants altogether.** In any one meeting, there are only few presenters who DO NOT WANT TO SHARE their works with others; let it be! But majority of them would be willing to share, especially those who present the works in technology transfer; only that the organizers do not put enough efforts and will give in only after one or two authors object to it. Imagining that if such materials could be shared widely as suggested, this will give much opportunity to humans to achieve in many things that will empower them to cope with many threats the world is facing right now.

This is our open letter requesting meeting organizers to make available the ppt files and other stuff that are shown at your events, so that they can be used for furthering the knowledge and help shorten the time to do research and implementation dealing with managing and caring of natural resources. After all, sharing information among participants *is* the exact purpose of a meeting! We urge all authors to be generous in giving – since what you will achieve from that – both tangible and intangible – will be much, much more than what you will part with. *Please remember that all of us live in only one world.* And we encourage all participants to request the organizers for the materials mentioned in this remark, preferably repeatedly for a good result.

Background:

The project is under the TerrAfrica Programme on Sustainable Land Management (SLM) in Sub-Saharan Africa. At a regional level, it requires strong collaboration among the four beneficiary countries, with buy-in by concerned ministries through inter-disciplinary and transboundary mechanisms, and collaboration with country Strategic Investment Programmes (SIP) for SLM and with other TerrAfrica projects for exchange of information and lessons learned in order to enhance uptake and scaling up of SLM practices.

The project is expected to contribute to a range of environmental and socio-economic benefits including enhanced productivity, carbon sequestration and reduced burning, maintenance of the hydrological regime and reduced vulnerability to climate change and land degradation. This will be achieved through integrated land resources and

ecosystem management (SLaM) and community and cross-border action planning, as well as strengthened regulatory mechanisms and harmonised policies and incentive mechanisms to overcome barriers to SLM. A better understanding of the causes and drivers of land degradation and impacts on livelihoods and ecosystem services through the use of land degradation/best practices assessment and monitoring tools (LADA, WOCAT, etc) and integrated ecosystem and sustainable livelihood approaches, will guide project planning, budgeting and implementation among stakeholders. This will ensure that locally-adapted SLM practices are adopted widely at farm, community and catchment levels across the river basin.

Tasks: The RPC will provide required technical and administrative support to guide the project activities and outputs and to ensure effective management of GEF and co-funding resources through close communication with FAO, the National Project Managers and designated national focal points.

Qualifications and Experience

- Bachelor and Masters or PhD in land resources management, agriculture, soil science, geography, or related field

1. REGIONAL PROJECT COORDINATOR – DETAILED TERMS OF REFERENCE

INTRODUCTION

Under the overall responsibility and direct supervision of FAO Lead Technical Unit, the regional project coordinator will provide overall leadership, management and technical guidance to ensure the achievement of project objectives and delivery of project outputs across the four countries in close consultation with the national project units, stakeholders and partners. The RPC will head the Regional Project Coordinating Unit (RCU) and provide required technical and administrative support to guide the project activities and outputs and ensure effective management of GEF and co-funding resources through close communication with FAO, the National Project Managers and designated national focal points for the project. The RPC will report to and be guided by the Regional Project Steering Committee (RPSC) and Regional Technical Advisory Committee (RTAC) to ensure the project achieves its goals and ensure cost effectiveness and sustainability.

SCOPE OF WORK

The primary duties of the Regional project manager will include:

- Provide technical guidance to the NPMs and their partners, identifying and addressing key issues, harmonizing technical objectives and approaches, formulating guidelines for the participatory identification, demonstration, testing/adaptation and replication of sustainable land and agro-ecosystem management practices in and across the basin;
- Prepare and monitor the annual Work Plans and budget of the overall project, based on proposed annual national work plans and budgets and adhere to approval processes (this will include liaising with NPMs for timely preparation and implementation of TORs, procurement, monitoring, participation and training plans);
- Identify potential candidates for the Regional TAC, in consultation with NPMs, PSCs and FAO, and mobilise RTAC members to provide support and review draft contracts/TORs and products (studies; reports, training, etc.)
- Provide overall technical and management guidance to the National project managers (NPMs) and National Technical Units in the execution of the project in the participating countries to ensure quality and timeliness of project work;
- Recruit and supervise experts/contract institutions as required to undertake tasks of a regional transboundary nature in accordance with annual workplan;
- Ensure effective liaison and maintain good communication with regional partners and other stakeholders including NGOs and Nile and Lake Victoria basin organisations, including mobilizing co-financing with partners and donors;

- Prepare contracts with selected partners (MOUs; LOAs), for approval by RPSC and FAO, and supervise work, including contracting of a GIS/RS centre for technical support across the basin for natural resources and land use monitoring, including support to one selected pilot district/country.
- Maintain records, with support of the administrative assistant, on technical and financial aspects of project operation, including monitoring of project activities and their outcomes; as well as minutes, decisions and recommendations of meetings and workshops for support and guidance of PSC members and FAO
- Organise RPSC meetings, regional workshops and other inter-country activities with guidance of RPSC (to be rotated among the countries as appropriate) including workshops for sharing experiences in thematic areas and exchange visits among stakeholders and project sites, in accordance with the annual work plan;
- Provide suggestions on harmonising strategies, policies and regulatory measures with a view to mainstreaming sustainable land and agro-ecosystems management and agricultural biodiversity conservation and developing synergies among regional and national sectoral plans and policies;
- Disseminate relevant documentation and experiences to the NTUs and partners building from experiences in other programmes and river basins in the region;
- Prepare timely and quality project progress and implementation reports for submission to FAO (in accordance with reporting procedures);
- Synthesize successful results and prepare and disseminate reports and guidance on best practices and approaches and incentive mechanisms for their wider replication and use.

DURATION, LOCATION AND NATURE OF APPOINTMENT

The appointment will be for 4.5 years in the Regional Coordinating Unit in Kigali, Rwanda, subject to probationary period and performance and extendable as necessary to reflect ultimate completion date of the project. The regional project manager will work from the RCU and travel as required in the basin and in the wider region, as required, with a briefing and debriefing mission to FAO headquarters.

QUALIFICATIONS

The regional project manager will preferably originate from the Nile basin countries, will be recruited competitively following announcements in regional and international press, and will have the following qualifications:

- At least 15 years working experience in agricultural and environmental management or related fields with recognised technical expertise

▲ **FAO Director and Bill Gates Meet to Discuss Agricultural Development Plans**

Jacques Diouf, Director-General of the United Nations Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO), and Bill Gates, co-chair of the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation, met in Rome earlier this week to discuss the role of agricultural development in reducing world hunger and poverty. FAO acknowledges the role that agriculture will play in providing food for an additional three billion people who will be living on our planet by 2050. Gates and Diouf also discussed the longer-term challenges to agriculture, including the impact of the global economic crisis on poor countries.

The Gates Foundation, the world's largest private foundation, has launched a program in agricultural development in 2006 in order to help small farmers overcome hunger and poverty. The Foundation has granted FAO some USD 5.6 million to push agricultural development in 17 countries in Sub-Saharan Africa. FAO collaborates with several institutions as part of the implementation of grants to the Africa-based Alliance for a Green Revolution in Africa (AGRA) in its work with small farmers and with the Cornell University for the development of rust-resistant wheat varieties. ▲ **Bioversity International's Vavilov-Frankel Fellowship Award**

Two young scientists, Danilo Eduardo Moreta Mejía and Esmaeil Ebrahimie are the new recipients of Bioversity International's Vavilov-Frankel Fellowship Award for their research on the useful genes found in rice and the wild varieties of soybeans.

Mejía, from Universidad del Valle in Colombia, submitted a proposal in which he highlights the mechanism of biological nitrification inhibition in rice. There are some rice species that are able to inhibit nitrification, and if other rice species could have this feature, then it could help in decreasing the use of nitrogen fertilizers and lessen its effect on the environment. On the other hand, Ebrahimie, who hails from Shiraz University in Iran, will search for genes in wild varieties of soybeans in Australia in an attempt to make the soybean varieties in Iran resistant to drought, salinity, and heat.

Established in 1989, the Fellowship Fund aims to encourage the conservation and use of plant genetic resources by enabling outstanding young scientists to carry out research outside their own countries for a period of between three months and one year. EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

The present severe economic and financial crisis has resulted in the collapse of banks, insurance and industrial companies, shrinking world trade that trigger protectionist trends leading to rising unemployment. Developing countries may again pay the highest burden due to lacking financial resources for job creation, credits and food imports. This is affecting rural communities and the urban poor, who are unable to obtain the resources for survival. Since 2007, the massive food price increases due to speculation and decline of food reserves have resulted in violent food riots in 2008 that caused at least 200 deaths. According to FAO another 40 million people have been pushed into hunger in 2008 and the number of undernourished people in the world reached 963 million. More than 24,000 people die of hunger-related causes daily and the financial and economic crisis could push even more people into hunger and poverty. Thus, food security has moved to the top of the international agenda.

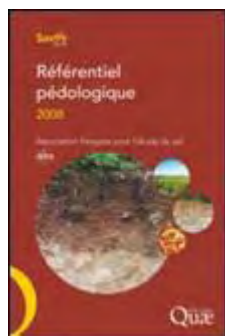
As a result of population growth, demand for food will increase further, primarily in developing countries. In a business as usual scenario of climate change the food supply will decline especially in drylands as crop yields are expected to fall, but also due to drops in exports from major grain producing countries (USA, Canada, Australia). With the projected decline in fish stock due to overfishing and climate change impacts the demand for food grown on scarce fertile land will increase. Additional pressures include changes in the diet by growing meat consumption and the competition between the production of food and biomass for electricity generation and biofuels as substitutes for fossil energy sources.

This has already triggered famines and an increase in forced migration from drylands that experience a major population growth and decline in food supply. Repeated famines and a decline in food security have resulted in violent clashes and/or civil wars (e.g. in Darfur that is both in the Sahel Zone and in the Nile Basin). The realization of the food-related Millennium Development Goals is in jeopardy.

During the 20th century the process of desertification has progressed; the land and the quality of the soil have degraded. While GLASOD claimed that 15% of the land surface was degraded, the GLADA reports referred to 24%. In the 21st century, anthropogenic and climatic factors will further degrade the soil both due to poverty (overgrazing and overuse of the land), market-driven expansion of agricultural production and depletion of aquifers in drylands. As a result of climate change the number and intensity of droughts will increase and thus the vicious circle of drought, forced migration leading to political crises and conflicts may exacerbate threats for human, national and international security.

In the past century the world population tripled and water consumption increased six times. There is a high probability that climate change impacts, growing water stress, biodiversity loss and increasing desertification, land degradation and drought (DLDD) may all contribute to future food crises, unless extraordinary and innovative strategies, policies and measures are launched now for coping with these multiple security relevant challenges that may negatively reinforce each other threatening the survival of billions of people, most particular in drylands.

On the background of these dramatic trends, soil security emerges as a constitutive paradigm of human, national and international security. It calls for a political process of securitization of DLDD issues and the development of effective international strategies, national policies and local measures based on a diagnosis of complex interactions between natural and societal causes. vocabulary of soil science, and is indispensable to anyone wanting to take account of the diversity of soil types.

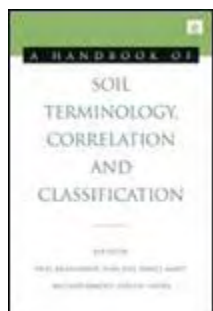

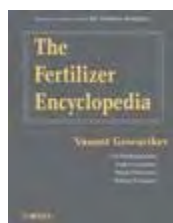

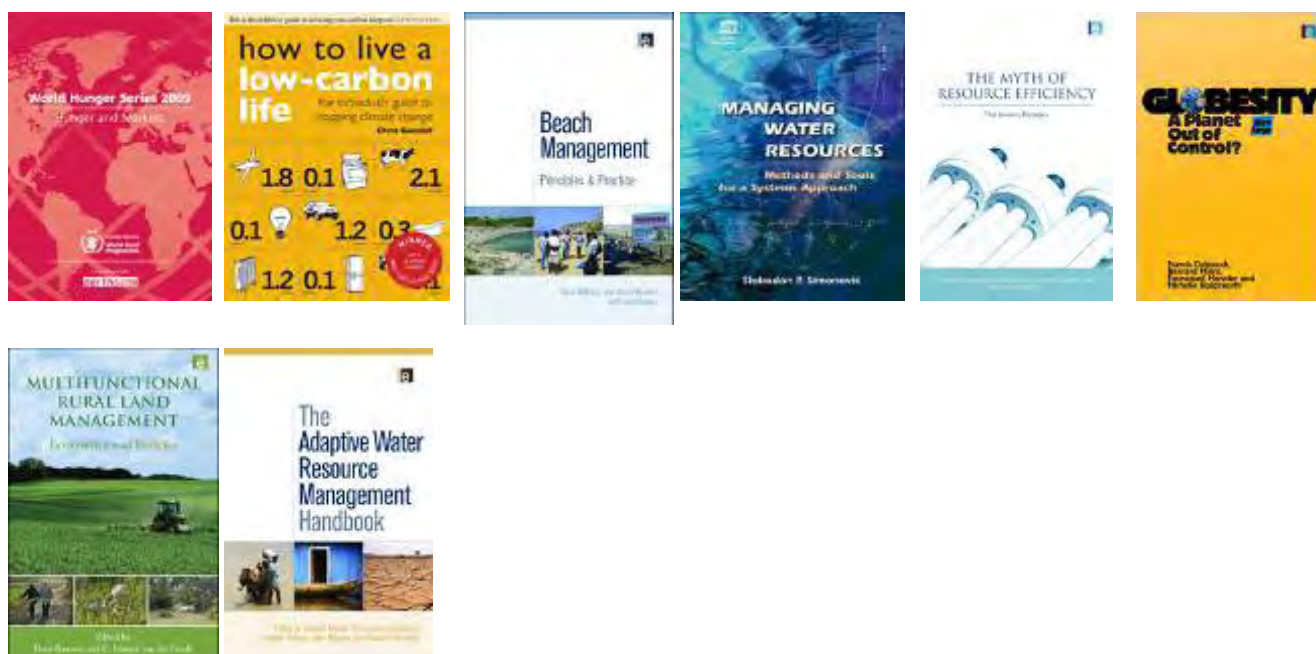

This leads to confusion and great difficulty in undertaking comparative scientific research that draws on more than one system and in making sense of international scientific papers using a system that is unfamiliar to the reader.

This book aims to clarify this position by describing and comparing different systems and evaluating them in the context of the World Reference Base (WRB) for Soil Resources. The latter was set up to resolve these problems by creating an international "umbrella" system for soil correlation. All soil scientists should then classify soils using the WRB as well as their national systems. The book is a definitive and essential reference work for all students studying soils as part of life, earth or environmental sciences, as well as professional soil scientists. 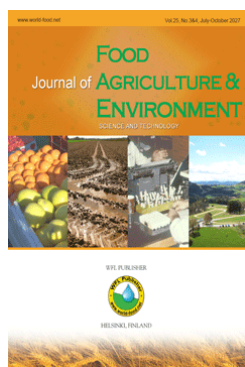

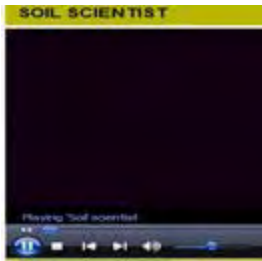

The DIGISOIL Consortium (FP7 funded project) involving the SOIL Action of the Joint Research Centre, is currently in the process of developing a new technology for the assessment of soil properties and soil degradation indicators that can be used for producing high quality geo-referenced soil maps.

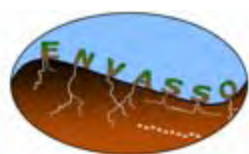

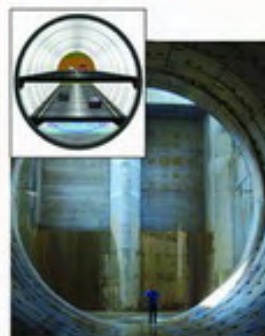

The sessions of the Congress will not be limited solely to soil conservation; it will embrace the scientific fields of soil protection, land use planning, soil mapping, remote sensing, drylands, peatlands, impact of climate change on soils, biofuels, water scarcity for irrigation, desertification, forest fires, and all those concerned within rural development. Nevertheless, the participation of scientists with expertise on biosoils, use of soil bioengineering techniques, bioremediation of contaminated sites, soils and biodiversity will be of high significance, since they offer great services in crucial scientific sectors.
