#### **EDITOR'S LONG NOTES**

#### 1. What we have done: WASWAC Newsletter, WASWAC Bulletin, WASWAC Hot News

Several members may remember that our association was set up to serve as a forum for soil and water conservationists worldwide. We had done a lot during the time our Secretariat was in USA, making a number of important publications available as well as having supported some members to do networking in certain areas. In late 2001, when I was about to assume presidency (2002-2004) my predecessors Hans Hurni, David Sanders and myself started to produce the **WASWAC Newsletter** (the ONLY publication at that time, considered the flagship of our association) in digital, so that we could deliver to members by e-mail. Luckily, I had had some experience from my office in Thailand before I retired. So the shift from the old-fashioned paper newsletter to a digital one proceeded smoothly. We even supplied the paper newsletter for three years to existing members, with additional digital copy to those who had capability. From 2005 onward, we abandoned the paper newsletter altogether, and thus we would have lost some members because of the digital divide.

Because of certain problems in the leadership of WASWAC, after my term ended in December 2004 I still had my hands on its businesses continually until now. Because of that, the production of the digital newsletter went on uninterrupted. We had issued four times a year like we did with the paper newsletter, except at one time in 2007 we had to combine three issues into one and from 2010 when its name was changed to WASWAC Bulletin that we reduced the frequency to three times a year; it was the time Prof S.S. Kukal of Punjab Agricultural University in Ludhiana, India, stepped in to be its Editor-in-Chief. There was a reason for the name change; some of us think the word 'Bulletin' is more academic than 'Newsletter'.

In 2006 I tried my hands on making **HOT NEWS** by collecting news that concerned meetings, funds, scholarships, books, journals, etc. and left the WASWAC Newsletter to the summary and conclusions of the outcome from various meetings plus some things that are not urgent. However, after having done HOT NEWS for a year, I felt that to issue HOT NEWS every three months would not suffice to benefit our members, as there was a large number of news available frequently, I therefore changed to issue HOT NEWS to every months, and might even add one extra issue for each month whenever there was something like a attractive fund that demands a quick deadline. This HOT NEWS may not look so orderly, we do not edit it so well, as we have to send out as quick as possible.

This year marks ten years since we started to issue our publication in digital format. We are quite pleased that we had crossed the digital divide fairly well and have emerged as a network that can communicate with others with this modern technology. Whenever we talk about the shift of newsletter from paper to digital the names of Hans Hurni and David Sanders always come up to my forehead! Admittedly, I am pleased that from January 1, 2012, **Dr Karika Kunta of the Thai Land Development Department** will take charge of the Editor-in-Chief post, with several academic persons assisting. So I may have more chance to do some other useful things for WASWAC.

At this time we are pleased that the ideology that we have taken for several years has shown out: I who has done the digital publications, both WASWAC Newsletter/Bulletin and WASWAC Hot News, for the past ten years will from January 1, 2012 relieve myself totally from such duties, leaving those challenging tasks to younger persons. This is what I always say to colleagues: when one is working for an organization (like WASWAC) one has to do everything to benefit its members and find the way to improve its performance at every opportunity – plus NOT to link oneself to the organization too tightly, something like to be synonymous, so that the organization would collapse if that person left.

#### 2. WASWAC Membership, Members and Officers

During 2002-2005, we had a continued discussion about WASWAC Membership, Members and Officers. By that time it was settled that our membership would comprise (1) Individual member, (2) Life member, (3) Organization member, (4) Gift member, and (5) Guest member. From the Organization membership we had made two related categories, (6) Organization subscriber and (7) Organization cooperator. Details are shown in the application-renewal form at the end of this HOT NEWS.

For the officers, it seems we have taken a very rough road. There are two general categories of WASWAC officers: **Councilors** and **Vice Presidents**. Councilors form a group of knowledgeable persons from various areas. During the early time WASWAC had five Councilors, but the number has increased since the year 2002 from 5 to 7 to 9 to 22 and to 30 persons in 2011. Councilors either their functions in the administration of WASWAC or represent countries or regions of the world.

In 2003, we experimented with a few countries to have their prominent/active people appointed as **National Representatives** (**NR**). It was a popular title and the number had grown to almost 100 persons in 2010. The main duties of these NRs are to send interesting articles to publish in our publications and to find new members when there is a chance. To avoid confusion from having both *National Representatives* and *Vice Presidents* doing almost the same work, in 2008/2009 we organized a voting among them; most people agreed on calling the title of those representing countries (and some regions) as **Vice Presidents**. Anyhow, there seems to be a problem in coordination within WASWAC, with a result that so few articles and other contributions have come from Vice Presidents. It is therefore necessary to overhaul the system soon in order to strengthen the activities of WASWAC. This is the task that President Li Rui and I will do in the early part of 2012.

#### 3. Special Publications

In 2002 David Sanders and I discussed about how to attract more people to join the association and it came up that we should publish a small booklet to compliment members at no cost once a year. We called it Special Publications (SPs). We could manage to do it twice, in 2003 (*Pioneering Soil Erosion Prediction: USLE Story*) and 2004 (*Carbon Trading, Agriculture and Poverty*). Again it came in 2008 as a much larger book, *No-Till Farming Systems*, as a result from my travel to South America in 2000 and 2004, with a chance to learn in-depth about no tillage in Argentina, Brazil and Chile. The volume that followed was *Soil and Water Assessment Tool (SWAT): Global Applications*, which was produced initially to support a SWAT meeting in Chiang Mai in January 2009. The year 2011 saw the first book in the series *Vegetable Agroforestry System in Southeast Asia*, which covers Vietnam, Philippines and Indonesia – and the remaining volumes will be ready in 2012. These later volumes of Special Publications carry some prices that mainly cover the production and delivery costs. More SPs are coming up, as it has proved the WASWAC is a suitable organization to produce such publications for serving worldwide members. Those in the pipeline are: *Conservation Agriculture in Southeast Asia; Text Book in Conservation Agriculture; Research in Wind Erosion;* and *Practical Use Of Soil And Water Conservation Measures* (using the results from WOCAT program in Bern, Switzerland).

#### 4. LANDCON e-LIBRARY: Our Gift To the Earth

LANDCON e-LIBRARY: Our Gift To The Earth is a set of DVDs that contain around 10,000 files of previous works in many fields of soil and water sciences, not only soil and water conservation *per se*. This is to enrich our members with works that have been available recently BUT individual members may not be able to access. We have invited members to contribute with their published and unpublished research and other works from about 30 years ago until now. Members started to send their files to us from early 2010 and now we have enough stuff to put into one set of 4 DVDs and will make it available shortly



after this. The works submitted to us include the following: papers/articles from meetings, proceedings, books, magazines, bulletins, whole books, reports, journals, magazines, bulletins, newsletters, MSc & PhD dissertations, presentations (PowerPoint or PDF files), posters, brochures, flyers, paintings and other forms of art, calendars, maps, soil museums, video-movies, audios (e.g. songs related to land, soil, water, river, forest, mountain), poems, photographs and any other media that are worth publicizing broader. Apart from this, we will produce 1-2 bonus DVDs called, LANDCON e-LIBRARY: Window To The World, which will include hundreds of PPT/PPS files showing countries of the world with different geography/people/ culture, documentary videos/movies and early movies from a century ago and later. One important work to include is HOME, a 93-min movie made by Yann Arthus-Bertrand, a French moviemaker who went around the world to film the destruction of our fragile earth from the air.

Since all the stuff has been received from members at no cost, and we got financial support from **Syngenta Co.** and **Crawford Fund of Australia**, we will make the LANDCON e-LIBRARY available to members for FREE. We will finish producing the DVD set in about 2-3 months after this and will be ready to send to members by **registered airmail**, with some details as follows:

- 1. We will send this DVD set to **Life members, Honorary members, Organization members, Organization subscribers** as our compliments,
- 2. For **five-year members**:
  - \* New members from 2011 will receive one set as a compliment.
  - \* Existing members from up to 2010 will receive one set when they renew their membership.
- 3. For **Guest members**, **Gift members** and **Organization cooperators**, they will receive their sets when they register as paying members.

Apart from receiving the DVD sets for free, members in categories 1 and 2 can order extra sets by paying ONLY the *handling and postage fee* as follows (preferably to send at the same time as the free set):

- a. One set: US\$20
- b. Two sets and up: US\$15/set (This means to get two sets one pays US\$30 as the handling and postage charge.)
  All transactions concerning the order of the DVD sets may be done through the **Western Union worldwide money transfer service** or other services as shown in the membership application form.

**Ideas behind the production of the LANDCON e-LIBRARY:** Despite a large budget provided for research, the results from them could not be available widely because of many reasons; some of them might be (1) people do not care to look and learn from the previous works, (2) people who hold data and information, e.g. conference organizers, do not like to spread things to other people who did not come to attend, and (3) the published papers available online used to cost very high, e.g. up to US\$30/paper.

Some front-line researchers had expressed doubt about the value of the works collected in this way, as they believe the stuff will become older and older with time and are static, while the stuff available from the internet are fresh, up-to-date, easy to find and are dynamic.

I usually give following reasons why we are doing this: I agree with the merits from searching from the internet but the positive points of producing the e-LIBRARY are: (1) some works are going to be forgot if not collected and preserved, thus the data will be lost and people who want to find the same thing may need to return to start from Step 1 again; (2) it is a practical way to introduce publications and publishers, a kind of exposure of these supporting institutions, and (3) since the works being collected are related to one or more disciplines of soil and water sciences, one may get some ideas of value to pursue the work by looking broader to some non- or not-so- related works, and this is in line with what Einstein had said, "Imagination is more important than knowledge". Related to the last point, when one goes through the e-LIBRARY in a simple way, one by one, one may find several extra things that they may not normally find through the internet search (some kind of Indiana Jones type of adventures).

We will therefore do this work as an activity of WASWAC to serve our members. We'll monitor the popularity of this e-LIBRARY and if it is, we will produce more, up to the availability of the stuff from our members, to be called Set II, Set III, Set IV and so on. #### 5. WASWAC cooperation with other networks: SWAT, CA, ANDF, and what next?

During these 28 years of our existence we have been looking to work with some networks that have similar mandates as WASWAC in promoting proper land use and sustainable agriculture. We had worked with a few networks every now and then but the links used to become thin after sometime and disappear eventually. We think that WASWAC can serve the purpose of those networks by disseminating ideas or technologies to our worldwide members who need them, thus a way to create synergy. Past experience indicated that, to have a strong and long-lasting link the administrators or coordinators of WASWAC MUST interact and mingle closely with people of those networks, either by meeting regularly at conferences or to operate any implemental program together. Unfortunately, WASWAC was not established in such a way that our administrators or coordinators can do such thing easily. We are functioning as a forum or venue for worldwide soil and water conservationists to use.

Eventually we could start to work with one active network, **Soil and Water Assessment Tool** (**SWAT**), since 2008 and the link between SWAT and WASWAC has become stronger and stronger until now. In August 2011 we made an agreement with a group of SWAT developers in Texas, USA, that WASWAC considers SWAT an **Associate Program**, so that we can work together to create synergy. So far WASWAC has produced a book on SWAT so that people can use it for general reading to get to know this 'open access' river basin computer model better, as the book describes how the model was applied (successfully) in 12 countries/regions of the world. Another thing worth mentioning is that WASWAC has worked closely with SWAT at certain meeting venues in Asia in 2011 [**Ho Chi Minh City, Vietnam (SWAT SEA II)** and **Guangzhou, China (SWAT School of Guangzhou)**] and has suggested ways that this versatile model could be used wider to benefit more people, thus accelerating the management and conservation of the world's most important natural resources, soil and water.

Conservation Agriculture (CA) is one major discipline that WASWAC has in its mandate, as it is almost the same thing as 'soil and water conservation', but probably with more emphasis in the issue of soil quality. There have been five world congresses in CA so far, but WASWAC has not become involved and the potential of our association to be used as a forum for these highly professional people has not been felt. However, we have recently started to work with the **Conservation Agriculture**Network in South East Asia (CANSEA) centered around Indochina and hope to play some role in it, especially at the 2<sup>nd</sup> WASWAC World Conference in May 2013 (see the next point).

A new network, **Asian Network on Debris Flow (ANDF)**, was set up in Chengdu, Sichuan Province, China, in 2010. This stemmed from the more frequent incidents of earthquake, landslide and debris flow in this mountainous province and in other Asian countries. Debris flow is a kind of erosion but at a much higher magnitude than ordinary soil erosion. To help accelerate their activities, WASWAC is cooperating in the production of their **ANDF Newsletter** and organizing **Debris Flow workshops**.

It can be generally said that WASWAC is pleased to assist any agency or network in doing activities that may lead to our common goal of managing and caring for the world's natural resources. We can help doing it because of our large number of members living in many countries and a large collection of existing technologies.

#### 6. WASWAC World Conferences

If one wants to gain high efficiency and much benefit in working together with other academics, professionals or agencies, one should go to attend conferences where one may have many face-to-face interactions with people from other agencies/countries. For WASWAC members we normally went to attend the ISCO (International Soil Conservation Organization) conference wherever it took place and had got a lot of acquaintances from many countries. That has also helped WASWAC to grow up. WASWAC and ISCO were born in the same year (1983) and from the same country (USA) and the two had been working hand in hand very well for many years – such that we considered the two as 'sister organizations'. But the thought was not quite shared by someone who had a control over the ISCO. Regrettably, from about the turn of the century there was a divergence of ideas of persons active in these two organizations with a result that the cooperation between the two has come down to the absolute minimum. Now it has become not possible for WASWAC to depend on ISCO for the conferences. It was therefore imperative that WASWAC had to organize by itself, in order to make available a venue for world members to come to share their findings and other information.

Such idea could be implemented for the first time in 2010 when Prof Li Rui, President-elect of WASWAC, organized the LANDCON 1010 conference in Xi'an, China during October 12-14, 2010. He also invited a number of Councilors to meet at the same time, so the event was called 1<sup>st</sup> WASWAC World Conference and Council Meeting or in short 1<sup>st</sup> WASWAC WC&CM. Deliberation at that event gave us many new ideas as well as the venue for organizing the 2<sup>nd</sup> WASWAC WC&CM at Pattaya, Thailand, in May 2013, which will coincide with the 50<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Celebrations of the Land Development Department of Thailand.

The WASWAC Secretariat in Beijing is open to receive application for organizing successive WASWAC WC&CMs (for 2016, 2019, etc.) or inter-conferences (in between two WC&CMs). Contact Dr Ning Duihu, WASWAC Secretary General at <a href="mailto:ndh@mwr.gov.cn">ndh@mwr.gov.cn</a> for more information.

#### 7. Sharing Information

Since the WASWAC was established with the initiation of the late Dr William C. Moldenhauer, we consider ourselves as a forum for people involved in managing/conserving natural resources of the world to share information with each other. This was done with a result that WASWAC has developed its expertise in producing books of many subjects of interest. However, for past several years I have developed a feeling that people in the world should share more information than what we are doing now, with the reason that we are living in only one world – whatever affects one will also affect another. Furthermore, the effect from the global warming has become clearer than before, especially with more rainfall caused by more water from the ocean evaporates to the sky, as shown in the episode of the great flood in Thailand in 2011 that caused more than 800 deaths, with total damages up to US\$45 billion.

WASWAC should do more to encourage sharing information among academics and professionals involved in natural resources management and conservation. Take the example of the **LANDCON e- LIBRARY**, there are dozens of categories of works that can be accommodated in small discs that can be shared among people of the same group, legally. Admittedly, there is one major obstacle that hinders such kind of information sharing: the distribution of **papers with copyright of the publishers**. WASWAC is an organization that respects this issue, so for the LANDCON e-LIBRARY that will accommodate thousands of digital stuff that members have been sending in, we choose to limit the use of the product to ONLY our members, so NOT to infringe on the copyright – and we thus make

such DVD sets as for internal communication. Few paragraphs that follow have been adapted from my article "Sharing Information to Accelerate Implementation of Reclamation and Improvement of Degraded Lands: WASWAC Experience" that will appear in a Springer book (edited by Shahid, S. of ICBA, Dubai, UAE) soon.

"For the research part, there have been many projects and programs that do research on land degradation, the executors of which are universities, government agencies, research institutions, etc. From doing research, there are a lot of results that are produced each year. The next step is to present the research findings at various venues or publish in peer reviewed scientific journals. There is one series of meetings, i.e. International Conference on Land Degradation (ICLD), that meets every 2-3 years in different parts of the world. Also, there is a series of meetings called ISCO (International Soil Conservation Organization) that meets every 2-3 years at various places too. An organization that is dealing strongly with land degradation is COMLAND (Commission on Land Degradation and Desertification), which is a part of the International Geographical Union. The organization has coordinated several COMLAND meetings in many parts of the world, and has produced many excellent publications. Apart from that, there are several other meetings that feature land degradation as an important theme, such as those organized by the ESSC (European Society for Soil Conservation), WASWAC (World Association of Soil and Water Conservation), IECA (International Erosion Control Association), SWCS (Soil and Water Conservation Society) and many other national societies of soil and water conservation.

"For the implementation part, the noted work to combat land degradation commenced in USA by the agency called Soil Conservation Service (SCS), which later changed its name to Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS). This agency is a part of the US Department of Agriculture (USDA). Many visitors from abroad go to learn soil conservation techniques and take back to apply in their own countries – often with certain degrees of modification.

"However, there has been a big gap in the success in technology research and application in developed and developing countries. Research being done in cooperation between researchers in developing and developed countries during past 30 years has brought about several findings, one very important of which would be the *Participatory Approach*, which is almost the ONLY way to assure the success of technology application in the farmers' fields. At the same time, the technologies involved in mitigating land degradation have been refined so much and can be classified into several categories – with different amounts of cost that suit the land of different terrains and people of differing wealth levels. WOCAT consortium with its secretariat in Bern, Switzerland has been operating to find these things out during the last two decades.

"Since 1983, the World Association of Soil and Water Conservation (WASWAC) was born out of the need to have a forum for soil and water conservationists in various parts of the world to work together. For two decades the association was operating from USA, a first world country, but it proved to be less than suitable at a later stage. So it moved out to locate in the People's Republic of China since April 2003, where it can handle and create many activities that serve members from both north and south countries very well. With good management, it is hoped that WASWAC will function properly in bonding people who take care of the health of the land, with a result that most of the world's population will lead their lives normally and far away from hunger. WASWAC has increased a number of activities during the past decade, which from a solitary task of producing quarterly newsletter, now it is able to handle almost one dozen activities, as well as function as a forum where people living in different environments can contact and work together through the new technology – internet – which has become available just in time to enhance the association to expand its sphere and make itself more useful to people living anywhere in the world."

I therefore would like to encourage our members to keep in mind about this issue of sharing information. At this stage I have a good news to inform you. Nowadays there have been more journals that are 'open access' that anyone may use their contents for any purpose from the websites – but many academics doubt about their quality. I admit that it might be true; the quality of papers from these journals may be inferior BUT their free availability will make them appealing to users and who knows, those journals that sell papers so expensively, like US\$25-30 per one online article, may need to adjust themselves to cope with the changing circumstances as well.

Before the end of this part, I would like to show two photos (in the next page) that I got from Facebook friends. At left you see one African mother taking a last look at her child who had possibly died of malnutrition before she would cover the mini-tomb with the loose soil. Second photo shows an Indian mother giving milk to both her child and a young deer. What do you think? If we think we are living in ONLY ONE WORLD, we have duty to share whatever we have to keep the world healthy and good for all living things. If because of the copyright law we will not share information between those who produce and those who need, would we allow whatever will happen to happen? I would like to leave the matter at this point and let those that will come later to help tackle this 'sharing or non-sharing of information' issue.





#### 8. Other Activities

Other activities of WASWAC include:

- Websites, operated from Guangzhou/Beijing (China) & Tokyo (Japan)
- Photo websites, operated from Bangkok
- Presenting various awards, e.g. Norman Hudson Memorial Award
- Coordinating LANDCON series of meetings, with use of Guidelines for Successful Meetings & provision of Cooperation Package
  - Organize/help organize meetings of interesting subjects
- Contacts among professionals in various countries through councilors, Vice Presidents, Special Representatives
  - Promotion of visits among academics of some countries
  - Promotion and assistance in building soil museums in various countries

#### 9. What direction is the WASWAC going?

It was in 1983 that WASWAC was established and it will become 30 years old when we organize the 2<sup>nd</sup> WASWC WC&CM at Pattaya, Thailand. As you may see, the WASWAC itself has great potential in becoming useful for people and natural resources. BUT the 'potential' needs to convert to 'reality' if we truly want it to function as said. To me, all councilors and other officers need to encourage people to sign up as members and do the duty to bring WASWAC forward to play the important role in advocating at various venues, so that those activities mentioned in the mandate of WASWAC can be practiced widely. Up to now, I think the infrastructure of WASWAC is already functioning; we only need able persons to run and make the association work according to the vision and mission of it, in a way of sharing tasks. 

# **CROPS AND CARBON: Paying Farmers to Combat Climate Change**

Mike Robbins

Earthscan, Abingdon, UK: 300 pages (2011)

This reviewer must show his hand, and admit that he supported the publication of this book from its original concept - and endorsed it on the back cover as follows:

"This book is important - and timely too - as the world begins to realise the connection between climate change, crops, farmers and the soil. Robbins sets out the facts and cogently argues the case for 'cropping carbon'. A must for all who care about the climate and those who depend directly on agriculture for their livelihoods"

Nevertheless, review it I shall, with as objective an eye as possible. But with the strong conviction that this is a book that we ignore at our peril. When Mike Robbins produced a slim "special publication" under the World Association of Soil and Water Conservation entitled "Carbon Trading, Agriculture and Poverty", many soil conservation specialists were made aware – for the first time – of the huge importance of soil carbon. And furthermore its inextricable link to climate change: for better, by tying up carbon in the soil through sustainable land management, or for worse, by losing carbon to the atmosphere through land degradation. That was in 2004.

Now the awareness is growing. And it is permeating through the donor and advisory agencies. Thus we have the World Bank with its push for "Climate-Smart Agriculture" and the FAO promoting "Save and Grow". The climate change/

soil carbon/ agriculture/ poverty nexus is acknowledged in these initiatives. But the science underpinning the links is complex and not well understood; equally worrying is an inadequately informed and growing debate about whether farmers should be paid for practices that increase soil carbon.

Appropriately thus, Mike Robbins returns in 2011 with an authoritative text, published under the watchful eye of Earthscan. Based on his PhD research, Robbins takes us on a fascinating and illuminating journey through climate change, soil science, economics, rural development, and philosophy. And that is one big merit of this book – it examines the topic from a truly multi-disciplinary perspective. But this also means that not all sections will be equally accessible to discipline-bound "specialists". Inevitably. But simultaneously this raises the important point that to understand the broad issues at stake we must break out of scientific reductionism and be able to see the wider picture.

The book begins with the connection between agriculture and the climate; it moves on to carbon and economics; and the third broad section looks at the human factor - farmers. Robbins concludes his cogently argued (and wellwritten) book by telling us that agriculture can mitigate climate change and this could be used to support "a sensible model for the developing world". He does not, however, shirk from identifying constraints to such a model, and that provides a refreshing balance.

There will be a vigorous debate about the principles and practices of paying farmers for "cropping carbon" at the UNCCD and UNFCCC conferences of parties (CoPs) later this year. There is a strong likelihood that the debate will be polarised between those in favour and those against. The World Bank are sure to make a stand for paying small-scale farmers to sequester carbon through better land management in a "multiple-win" scenario. Some other agencies, the NGO ActionAid for one, will protest that carbon markets for smallholders simply won't work and should not be contemplated. But let this be an informed debate - and there is no better place to start the search than page one of Robbin's excellent contribution. William Critchley, Amsterdam, September 2011

#### Eijkelkamp Wet sieving apparatus

To determine the aggregate stability of soil, 8 sieves are filled with a certain amount of soil aggregates. These sieves are placed in a can filled with water, which will move up and downward for a fixed time. Unstable aggregates will fall apart and pass through the sieve and are collected in the water-filled can underneath the sieve. The testing procedure results in an index for aggregate stability.

#### ▲ World Bank maps soil carbon sequestration

A new geo-database developed by the Agriculture and Rural Development (ARD) division of the World Bank offers estimates of soil carbon sequestration in Africa based on different land management practices. Considered on a per hectare basis for 20-25 years, land management practices in the model include agroforestry, composted manure, direct manure, green manure/ cover crops, no-till practices, and residue management.

#### REPORT

Report finds that U.S. conservation incentives can impact nutrient run-off

The USDA's Economic Research Service (ERS) recently issued the report, Nitrogen in Agricultural Systems: Implications for Conservation Policy. It outlines best management practices (BMPs) to reduce nitrogen emissions in agriculture, assesses the current state of use of those practices in U.S. field cropland, and proposes incentive mechanisms to improve nitrogen use efficiency. These incentives include traditional financial payments for adopting BMPs, but also embedding nitrogen efficiency standards in farm subsidy eligibility and promoting greenhouse gas emissions markets. # From the African Young Scientists and Youth Initiatives on Climate Change and Indigenous Knowledge Systems (AYSICCIKS)

To the 17<sup>th</sup> Conference of the Parties (COP17) - United Nations Framework Convention on Climate Change (UNFCCC) and the 7<sup>th</sup> Session of the Conference of the Parties serving as the Meeting of the Parties (CMP7) to The Kyoto Protocol, Durban, South Africa (COP17/CMP7)

We the African Young Scientists and Youth Initiative on Climate Change and Indigenous Knowledge Systems (AYSICCIKS) who met at the COP17/CMP7 - Durban UN Conference 2011 for the Round Table Discussions on the Role of Indigenous Knowledge and African Young Scientists and Youth in Climate Change Adaptation and Mitigation:

**Realize** that Africa is one of the most vulnerable continents to the adverse effects of climate change.

Recognize at the same time that many African communities have for centuries developed and used community-based knowledge systems to adapt and mitigate climatic changes for sustainable livelihood. These include early warning systems, such as behaviours of living organisms, short-term weather monitoring cycles,

climatic variability experiences and use of appropriate livestock breeds, plant varieties, resource management practices, e.g. mixed cropping practices, cultivation of drought resistance crops for sustainable food security.

**Acknowledge** that our primary responsibility to properly document these knowledge systems for validation/affirmation to inform climate change research and development in order for them to contribute to the global body of knowledge and search for sustainable solutions to climate change adaptation and mitigation.

**Recognize** that climate change adaptation and mitigation technologies built on Indigenous Knowledge Systems (IKS) are sustainable and successful because they are locally tested, culturally acceptable and accessible.

**Realize** that these community-based knowledge systems have been marginalized by dominant western knowledge systems in the search for sustainable solutions to climate change adaptation and mitigation.

**Notice** that most of the Indigenous Knowledge (IK) is resident in older members of the African communities, hence threatening its sustainability and minimising its potential to contribute to the global knowledge pool. It is important that IK is documented and shared with the younger generations to ensure its sustainability and successful application to meet current and future developmental challenges.

**Notice** that the younger generations have a high potential to mobilise communities to respond to climate change as a challenge of their generation because they live in these communities; are largest part of the population; they know the local cultures including languages and are among the most vulnerable social groups affected by the adverse effects of climate change, such depletion of natural resources which lead to limited employment opportunities and poverty and hence vulnerable to risky behaviours such as prostitution, drug abuse, etc. which lead to the infection of dreadful diseases such as HIV/AIDS, etc.; the young scientists are exposed to modern technologies and methodologies which are crucial for IKS documentation and interfacing of IKS with modern science and technology to cope with global knowledge and developmental challenges.

**Realize** the importance of organising annual conferences and workshops as platforms to share experiences on IKS research and community engagement in climate change.

**Recognize** the importance of promoting and conserving African indigenous languages through research, capacity building and community engagements in collaboration with indigenous knowledge holders and practitioners.

**Having noted** the above, the AYSICCIKS seeks to:

- **Establish** a steering committee composed of representatives from different regions of Africa with the mandate to draft a strategic action plan, communication and marketing strategies, activity programme and fund-raising. This will be in collaboration with the African Youth Forum in Science and Technology (AYFST). This is a youth wing of the African Technology Policy Studies Network (ATPS).
- Mobilize African young scientists and youth within and outside Africa to promote the role of African
  indigenous knowledge systems in climate change adaptation and mitigation through research and community
  engagement.
- Mobilize and sensitize public and private funding organizations within and outside Africa to fund research
  and community engagement activities of African young scientists and youth in climate change adaptation and
  mitigation
- Create platforms including research, community engagement activities, workshops, etc. to facilitate constant
  interaction and exchange of experiences between Indigenous knowledge holders and practitioners with
  African young scientists and youth to ensure the sustainability of indigenous knowledge systems.
- Conduct (in collaboration with indigenous knowledge holders and practitioners) comprehensive documentations on indigenous knowledge systems in climate change adaptation and mitigation in respective communities and countries.
- **Develop** a knowledge agenda on Indigenous Knowledge Systems and African young scientists and youth in climate change adaptation and mitigation.
- Facilitate capacity building programmes and projects for the African young scientists and youth on indigenous knowledge systems and climate change in collaboration with governmental, non-governmental institutions and indigenous knowledge holders and practitioners.
- Create an all Africa think-tank of African young scientists on IKS and climate change research and development.
- **Develop** a database of African young scientists and youth involved in IK and climate change research and community engagement to facilitate network building.
- **Initiate** a continental post-graduate programme at Masters and Doctorate levels on IKS and climate change to build a critical mass of scientists on IKS and climate change in Africa.
- Facilitate the formation of indigenous knowledge (IK) and climate change clubs in educational institutions for promoting knowledge and awareness on the role of IK and African young scientists and youth in climate change adaptation and mitigation.
- **Translate** IKS related to climate change adaptation and mitigation into business enterprises for job creation and income generation for African young scientists and youth, especially young women as the most vulnerable group to unemployment.
- **Organize** a continental workshop to interrogate the role of indigenous knowledge systems in Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Degradation (REDD+).
- Facilitate the mainstreaming of IKS and climate change into the educational systems in Africa.
- Develop (in collaboration with national and international mass and folk media) an effective communication
  and marketing strategy for the activities of the African young scientists and youth in promoting the role of IKS
  in climate change.
- **Facilitate** the formulation of national, regional and continental policy and legal frameworks to protect and promote the role of IKS in climate change.

# Background

Asia is the most prone to debris flow hazard in the world because of the geological and metrological conditions, especially, as the extreme climates increase, more and more debris flows occurred in Asia in the past several years. For example, in the summer of 2010, heavy rainfall hit Southeast Asia and South Asia, thousands of people died in the flood and debris flow induced by the rainfall, millions of people were left homeless. In September, 2011, more than 80 people died because of debris flow in Thailand. Moreover, with the clear trend of global climate change, the Asian countries will meet more serious challenges to live with risk.

The ANDF (Asian Network on Debris Flow) was proposed to provide a platform to hold academic conferences and trainings, to promote the project collaboration, to improve the debris flow study and mitigation technology in all Asian countries. The international workshop of ANDF will be held every two years. The 2010 International Debris Flow Workshop was held by the Institute of Mountain Hazards and Environment, CAS, on November 27-28th, 2010 in Chengdu, China. Theme of this series of workshop is "Debris-Flow Hazards Mitigation and International Cooperation".

# Objectives

On the way we can visit Niujuan Gully, the epicenter of the 5.12 Wenchuan earthquake, Hongchun Gully debris flow site, which blocked Min River and threatened the Yingxiu Town in 2010, Gaojia Gully debris flow site which damaged the National Highway for 16 days in 2011, Miancu River debris flow site which ruined chemical plants and caused 125 people sick in 2011, and so on. The

slope debris flows in this area are also densely distributed.

Jiuzhaigou Valley is an outstanding product of nature. Here are towering and glittering snow peaks, clear and charming lakes, colorful waterfalls, violent torrents, and verdant forests, and glittering snow peaks. #### Weather

Chengdu is the capital of Sichuan Province, and is located in the western Chengdu Plain. It has a subtropical climate; the temperature here will be between 25 and 32 centigrade during the workshop.

#### **Airport Construction Fee**

Passengers taking Chinese domestic airliner must pay an Airport Construction Tax and Added Fuel Price Tax in addition to the air-ticket. Airport Construction Tax is 50 Yuan. Added Fuel Price Tax varies according to distance of flight. Currently, 50 Yuan is charged for flights shorter than 800 kilometers and 140 Yuan for flights longer than 800 kilometers.
