Editor's Note: A major milestone

In December 1994, while sitting in front of the auditorium of the Conference Center of New Delhi during the 8th ISCO conference, the then WASWC President



Hans Hurni (left) asked me if I would like to serve as a Vice President (VP) in his council. I said YES. At that time there were up to about 8 VPs, holding the title of 'regional vice president'.

From then until today, for more than 16 years, I have been serving in WASWC council all the time without a break, doing work in about half a dozen positions, e.g.

Vice President, Deputy President, President, Immediate Past President, Acting President, Immediate Past President (again), Past President and, this time, Advisor in the 2011-13 council of President Li Rui (right).

For all these years, with many active colleagues in various councils, WASWC (or 'WASWAC' from January 2010) has grown up sizably and metamorphosed to become an organization that truly serves the world - thanks largely to the adoption of the internet system of

communications from late 2001 until now - plus few other factors that had coerced the moving of the secretariat (aka headquarters) from a first world country (USA) to a developing country (China).

During the past decade WASWAC has produced several forms of media that are useful for members. From the year the association was established in 1983, a quarterly Newsletter was regularly sent out as hard copy up to 2001. Then the electronic version was produced and sent along with the hard copy to members who were hooked with the internet. From 2005 onward we finished the hardcopy and only the electronic one was sent out; it has become a regular practice up to now.

The quarterly WASWAC Newsletter was at all times dedicated to announcing meeting events and reporting their outcomes, and was a solitary publication of the association. From 2006 onward, I tried my hand in separating news about meetings, funding, scholarships, awards, training courses, exhibitions, study tours,

publications, etc. into a separate cover, and called it HOT NEWS. At first it was done quarterly too, but because of the great abundance of such news, we decided to release it monthly from 2007 and there have been some extra issues during the times when many issues indicated very quick deadlines, especially concernign funding. Despite the name of 'HOT' being not so academic, it has survived for five years already and no other name has been proposed to replace it yet.

In the meantime, the original WASWAC Newsletter has been dedicated to reporting the outcome from



various meeting events, which are considered not so hot though essential; thus the publication still retains its reputation as the flagship of the association. Since early 2010, the Newsletter has been renamed WASWAC Bulletin, being issued thrice a year and wholly dedicated to academic reporting. **Prof Surinder S. Kukal** (left) of Punjab Agricultural University in India has been the Editor-in-Chief of the Bulletin, with a number of Senior Associate Editors. Since the previous WASWC Journal and Proceedings were finished since 2009, we are thinking whether this WASWAC Bulletin

should incorporate scientific papers too, or we should start a new publication in the form of journal; the newly established secretariat of WASWAC in Beijing with adequate funding shows a great potential for doing that. Whether it will be 'this' or 'that', we will decide very soon.

For HOT NEWS, we report all news items that are of immediate interest because of their nature in having short deadlines in communicating with the hosts. This is well received by all members and I believe they benefit a lot from going through this monthly online publication. In each issue there are many publications publicited, e.g.

books, reports, newsletter, magazines, bulletins; many of them are free – you just e-mail the publishers. To have HOT NEWS sent to you directly each month with hundreds of such news, we are probably the only association that serves members this way! Particularly at this milestone period I am lucky to have **Dr Karika Kunta** (right) of the Land Development Department of Thailand serving as my Co-editor, and she will take over as its Editor soon.





Apart from these, we host the WASWAC websites in Tokyo (Japan), Guangzhou and Beijing (China) and two Webshots photo websites. Other activities include issuing annual Special Publications; granting Norman Hudson Awards and other awards; coordinating LANDCON series of meetings, with use of Guidelines for Successful Meetings & provision of Cooperation Package; organize/help organize meetings of interesting subjects; forming forum for discussion, e.g. law & policy, climate change, monitoring and evaluation (M&E), no-till; establishing contacts among professionals in various countries through councilors, Vice Presidents, Special Representatives; promotion of visits among academics of some countries; and promoting/assisting in building soil museums in various countries. Many WASWAC members find them useful.

Having come to this point when we have a firm house in Beijing for our secretariat to stay (above), with **Prof Li Rui** as the president for this term, with **Prof Miodrag Zlatic** (left) as the



Immediate Past President to help and work along with, and with a strong council of 30 men of wisdom (*yes, all councilors are men, see details in the next page*) living/working in various countries of the world, I am most pleased to stay on and assist, at least to the end of this term, as the *Advisor*. As mentioned, most duties that I had been responsible before have been transferred to the hands of several able people – I thus have no



doubt about the success of the association in this term and far beyond that.

Today I have become 70 (a *septuagenarian*, as it is called) and feel it is ripe in terms of a working person. I therefore would like to humbly announce my stepping down from most posts that I have been holding in WASWAC and wish the new administration well in advancing the course of action of our association to benefit worldwide people in sharing information, technology and wealth in order to help each other manage and care for the natural resources – importantly soil and water – in various parts of the world.

Before closing (as I know from now I will play a smaller and smaller role in WASWAC and you will hear less from me), I would like to thank all people who have played certain roles in making WASWAC delivered, survive and function well in this world, particularly within my time to those appearing in the blue chart (next page) who were instrumental in making the move to make the WASWAC stay at a stable place.

Apart from that, I wish to thank profoundly the two persons as follows.



Bill Moldenhauer. He had established the WASWC single-handedly in 1983 and served in various positions all the time until he passed away in May last year. He regularly observed the health of the association, which roughly corresponded with the number of members; it was >700 in the period 1987-1990 but came down to around 300+ in 2000. His voice was a strong component in enabling the move of the secretariat to a less expensive country – eventually to China. My dear wife *Leticia Pugay* who though without any agreement at the start of my tenure faithfully allows her husband to spend full time for running the WASWAC (on the voluntary basis – no compensation) while she takes care of all household works. As a citizen of the Philippines, the country where English is used widely, her presence helps me immensely in commanding this foreign language that Thai people are not so familiar with. The generous help that enables her husband to do this work comes from the pride that this combined effort may help sustain the world's natural resources or at least delay their deterioration somewhat. We both feel that when their

Last, the real last, but a rather personal one, I would like to thank those who congratulated me for having become a septuagenarian. ISTRO Working Group B – Subsoil Compaction Training course Soil Deformation: Modelling, Measurements and Visualization September 26 – October 2, 2011

To be held at Aarhus University, Faculty of Agricultural Sciences, research Centre, Foulum, Tjele, Denmark **Course content:** The course will present classical and new approaches for measurement, modelling, and visualization of soil deformation due to mechanical stress application. The concepts and theory classically used in

agricultural soil mechanics and adopted from geomechanics (analytical solutions for stress propagation in soil, soil compressive strength, Finite Element Model (FEM)) have limitations that will be illustrated with hands-on modelling and measurements in the lab and in the field. As a new modelling approach for soil deformation, Discrete Element Models (DEM) will be used to understand particle-particle contact problems, stress propagation and displacement behaviour of granular media. Both approaches (i.e. DEM and FEM) will be compared to explore the mechanical behaviour of agricultural soils at the macroscale (DEM) and at the microscale (FEM). As an alternative to the classical laboratory methods for soil stress-strain characterisation, the potential of non-destructive techniques to characterise soil strength *in situ* (seismic methods) will be presented.

The course will last seven days. Each day will begin with a lecture session. The second half of the day will involve hands-on modelling and measurement activities. On the 7th day we call on the Ph.D. students to participate in a young scientist forum, where the aim is exchange of knowledge, experience, and ideas. There will also be a possibility of individual consultancy concerning experimental problems.

General Aspects of the Mechanical Behaviour of soils (stress theory, strain theory, stress-strain relations.

Traditional Soil Mechanics Modelling (Elastic stress-strain relationships - analytical solutions, Elasto-plastic stressstrain relationships - FEM.

Traditional Soil Mechanics Measurement Methods including compressive behaviour, shear strength, tensile strength and penetrometer resistance

New Approaches to Infer Soil Mechanical Models (non-destructive field methods to measure soil strength, particle arrangements measurements using three-dimensional imaging techniques)

New Approaches to Model Soil Mechanical Behaviour (Distinct Element Modelling)

Impact and adoption of conservation agriculture in Africa: a multi-scale and multi-s analysis





A Payments for Ecological Services and Eco-Compensation in China

The collection of papers presented at the International Conference on Payments for Ecological Services convened in Ningxia Hui Autonomous Region in September 2009, was published in December 2010. Compiled by the Asia Development Bank, the book includes case studies of eco-compensation in China, analyses of Chinese perception on payments for ecological services, and papers on international experiences in markets for ecosystem services. In Conference paper 4: Buyer, Regulator, and Enabler – The Government's Role in Ecosystem Services Markets (pages 149-164), Michael T. Bennett of Forest Trends and Sara J. Scherr of EcoAgriculture Partners outline lessons for PES in the People's Republic of China. Synthesized in the context of agriculture, the report examines how a government can play the part of buyer, regulator, or enabler. Under each of these categories, examples are presented, in addition to an analysis of strengths and deficiencies of the programs.

An Output-Based Intensity Approach for Crediting Greenhouse Gas Mitigation in Agriculture

Published in the first issue of the journal Greenhouse Gas Measurement and Management (February 2011), this publication examines a potential offset mechanism based on on the level of greenhouse gas emissions reductions for a certain amount of agricultural production or "output". This differs from the traditional method of considering emissions reductions over a certain physical area (e.g. the size of a farm) regardless of how much is actually produced on the land.

The authors, Brian Murray and Justin Baker of the Nicholas Institute for Environmental Policy Solutions at Duke University, argue that the output-based approach would incorporate the potential for and even encourage growth in crop yields. It would also be more consistent with food security objectives, include more activities eligible for the offsets, and be a more economically competitive method than per-area emissions reductions. At the same time, the authors note that total agricultural emissions might actually increase without an overall cap, the issue of additionality remains a concern, and linking credit payments to yields may increase uncertainty and volatility experienced by farmers. Overall, the paper is targeted at proposals for regulatory and voluntary carbon markets, but also presents lessons applicable to other low-carbon strategies. Access the working paper.

▲ cd3wd: A Digital Treasure Trove of Technical Information for Development Workers

Recently, Mike Fennema, Country Consultant for CRWRC Laos, asked whether I had ever seen the following website, <u>www.cd3wd.com/cd3wd/</u>. In fact, I had recently come across the site and was impressed with this vast online resource of technical information.

Some of us remember the Age of Pre-Digital Agriculture and Community Development Work when there were few technical resource libraries available. In those days, the best that many development workers could do was to accumulate some essential reference books. For a lucky few, microfiche libraries of technical topics offered the most concentrated cache of information.

I'm certain that anyone who accesses <u>www.cd3wd.com/cd3wd/</u> for the first time, especially those who were engaged in development work prior to the mid-1990s, will be amazed at the sheer volume of the digital technical information being offered on this website.

The person who funds and runs **cd3wd** is Alex Weir who has an engineering and software development background, working in both commercial and aid/development sectors.

Alex established **cd3wd** in 2003 as a free online and offline resource. The website currently offers approximately 4,000 high-quality practical digital documents related to a wide range of development concerns including agriculture, forestry, fisheries, food processing, soil and water conservation, health, education, water and sanitation, appropriate technology, alternative energy, metalwork, woodwork, small industries and much more. The info is presented in largely in HTML format, with Graphics Interchange Format (GIF) and JPG graphics files as well as some PDF files.

Alex reports that the <u>www.cd3wd.com/cd3wd/</u> website has currently 3 million webpage hits per year and growing at 20% per annum. He describes the effort as "a leverage operation" in that he and his collaborators do not create their own content but rather "collect, collate, organize and market content from organizations such as GTZ, USAID, Skat, KIT, DFID, VITA, Practical Action, etc."

To increase the availability of **cd3wd** resources throughout the developing world, Alex recently created a DVD set which contains the complete **cd3wd**, which is ready for offline installation on PCs as well as Macs and Linux machines. Besides

conventional http downloads from the <u>www.cd3wd.com/cd3wd/</u> website, this set is also available as a BitTorrent which Alex describes as a way of downloading large files that spreads the load over many servers and PCs.

Meanwhile, for easy online access to cd3wd's technical resources, simply click on http://www.cd3wd.com/cd3wd_40/cd3wd/index.htm.

To further the work, **cd3wd** welcomes additional cooperation and funding. Alex states that the objective of **cd3wd** is "to enable the Third World to help itself - technology can increase productivity and incomes, create a better life, decrease and eliminate poverty, disease and even injustice."



1. Rationale and Background

Education is considered a vital ingredient in fighting hunger and poverty. The fact that over 1.2 billion people world-wide are classified as poor with over 70 percent of these people being rural - based led the Asia Pacific Association of Educators in Agriculture and Environment (APEAEN) to address education for rural people as a means for overcoming hunger and poverty through various programmes, projects and activities.

In 2002, APEAEN implemented in Laguna, Philippines the 1st International Conference in Agriculture and Environment with the theme "Searching for New Models of Agriculture Education in a Disturbed Environment". In 2004, the 2nd International Conference was implemented in Suwon, South Korea with a theme on "Best Practices in Poverty Alleviation through Education for the New Century". In 2007, the 3rd International Conference was held in Nueva Ecija, Philippines adopting the theme "Preparing for the Future: Rethinking Higher Agricultural Education and Environment in Asia Pacific".
